




### i) Teen Culture in the 1960's


- "The Outsiders" was written <u>by</u> a teenager, <u>about</u> teenagers, and <u>for</u> teenagers
- This makes it the first of its kind Outsiders





 Teenagers in 1967 may have expressed themselves differently than teenagers today, but they experienced many of the same challenges that teenagers face today.






Remember what John Green said:

"[Teenagers] are in the area of conflict between the person that they are, the one they want to be and the one they might be."





# ii) Heroes in "The Outsiders"


# iii) Friendship & Loyalty

# iv) Coming of Age

- The events of "The Outsiders" change Ponyboy drastically. He grows up <u>a lot</u> in a short amount of time.
- We can't always control the events in our lives, but for better or for worse they can have a huge impact on who we become
- There is always time to change!



# v) Conflict

- As human beings, we have a tendency to organize ourselves into groups (both big and small) and there can be conflict between groups
- Conflict is often the result of "othering," or focusing too much on differences between people instead of similarities

- We should all strive to be more like
  Ponyboy towards the end of the novel and learn to see people as "just guys" (or girls!) instead of as "socs," "greasers," etc.
